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LAWRENCEVILLE — When Rich Gabaldon walked into Takedown Sportswear he was instantly greeted by Randy and Dustin Kawa.

“Hello, hello,” Dustin said.

“I need to get a pair of wrestling shoes,” Gabaldon replied.

Gabaldon only needed shoes for his son, a Peachtree Ridge baseball player and wrestler, but he could have gotten just about anything he needed at Takedown Sportswear.

In just three years of existence, Takedown Sportswear has flourished. But this isn’t your typical mom and pop sporting goods story. The father-son duo of Randy and

tom design for uniforms and training gear, Takedown Sportswear has its own clothing line.

“Instead of wrestlers buying Tapout or Fight stuff, they are buying wrestling gear,” Dustin Kawa said. “We are one of the only companies in the country that sells a brand for wrestlers designed by wrestlers.”

Takedown Sportswear did business with high school and college teams from 30

contract with the American Crown Series, the toughest and largest national tournaments in the country. That means their clothing line will be available to wrestlers throughout the county next season.

If that wasn’t enough, they are also partners with the apparel company Knuckle Up Fight Gear, which is the largest mixed martial arts training facility in the state.

While Takedown Sportswear has expanded tremendously over the last year, it hasn’t lost its local roots. Ever since the company first started in 2006 it has donated all of the uniforms for Team Georgia wrestlers to compete in national tournaments. With more than 125 Team Georgia wrestlers, that’s roughly \$25,000 worth of uniforms, which is even
